- 2008 Forward Coping with Moratorium




SETTING UP YOUR TEAMS



- Eleven Curricular areas. Drama, English, Gaeilge, Geography, History, Physical Education, Maths, Music, Science, S.P.H.E., Visual Arts.
- (plus ICT which impacts on all) (plus Religion in faith schools)
- Have a minimum number of staff per team and ideally, representative of class levels/support teams
- Select two curricular areas of interest to you at the start of school year.
- Insert curriculum slot in all staff meetings apart from September.
- Organise in-school planning time (large school physical) small school (online) within the school day.
- 30 min presentation at staff meeting on useful methodologies/ideas/resources at each class level (by the curriculum team)

BENEFITS TO THE SCHOOL

- Whole staff participation
- Sharing good practice / developing 'ideas bank'
- No 'us and them' (postholders /non-postholders)
- Leading curriculum at the centre (seen as priority) / curriculum balance
- Horizontal and vertical curriculum planning /keeps all teachers up to speed
- Internal accreditation
- Experience of presenting to whole staff
- Working as part of a team
- Opportunity to develop curriculum expertise / pursue curricular interest
- Fosters external curriculum links / cpd



SAMPLE: VISUAL ARTS - STAFF MEETING - OCTOBER 15



TIPS (1) / CREATIVE IDEAS FOR VISUAL ARTS

- 1. Vary your display in shape/size/background. Cut your artwork into strips/ squares triangles, space and mount on sugar paper. Let each child make and decorate their own A3 portfolio as an art lesson.
- 2. Mix the media work on an interesting paint background for one lesson and add an oil pastel/charcoal drawing on top the following week. Use Indian links and roll over your page. When it dries colour the in-between areas with pastel/chalks.
- 3. Applique Add beads/jewels / etching to clay work, weave pipe cleaners and fabric through hessian.
- 4. Texture Add texture to paint work by adding salt for grit, icing sugar for a 'bleeding' effect, sand/porridge for interesting beaches, mountains cto
- 5. Tools use a comb, a toothbrush, a blunt knife, cotton buds, pai to scrape, splash, stipple paint. Have a Drawing Box with art sheets for the early finishers.



TIPS (2) CREATIVE IDEAS FOR VISUAL ARTS

- 6. Re-use. When printing do extra sheets, the spare ones can be used for collage at a later date. For materials use RECREATE.IE term visits.
- 7. Plaster of Paris: Easy to use and fast-drying. Add crumbled chalk to the wet mixture to give a marbled effect. (DO NOT POUR DOWN SINK-CAUSES BLOCKAGE)
- 8. Dye materials/hessian. Leave overnight in a basin using DYLON clothes dye (available for chemists) Use transformed fabric for another lesson.
- 9. Look and respond. Use A3 prints /stories to generate discussion in pairs, jump into the picture, write a poem to explain the painting, you are the girl in the picture, act out what you would do, tell where you are coming from/going.
- 10. Relax and Enjoy Do not rush to produce a perfect finished product. Use ICT (digital camera /tablet)to capture the construction/process. Use calming music.
- 11. Use 'I am an Artist 'website to learn new techniques/processes.

Visual arts should be relaxing, therapeutic and enjoyable for child and teacher!
