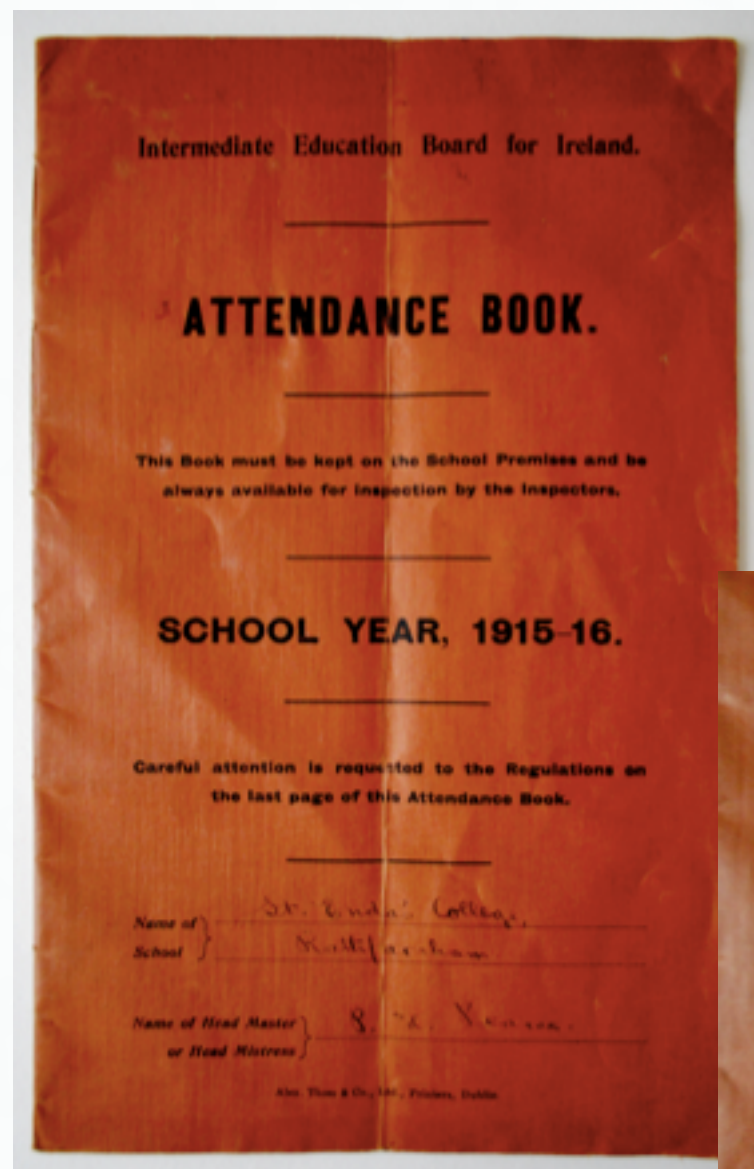

St. Enda's Attendance Book 1915-1916

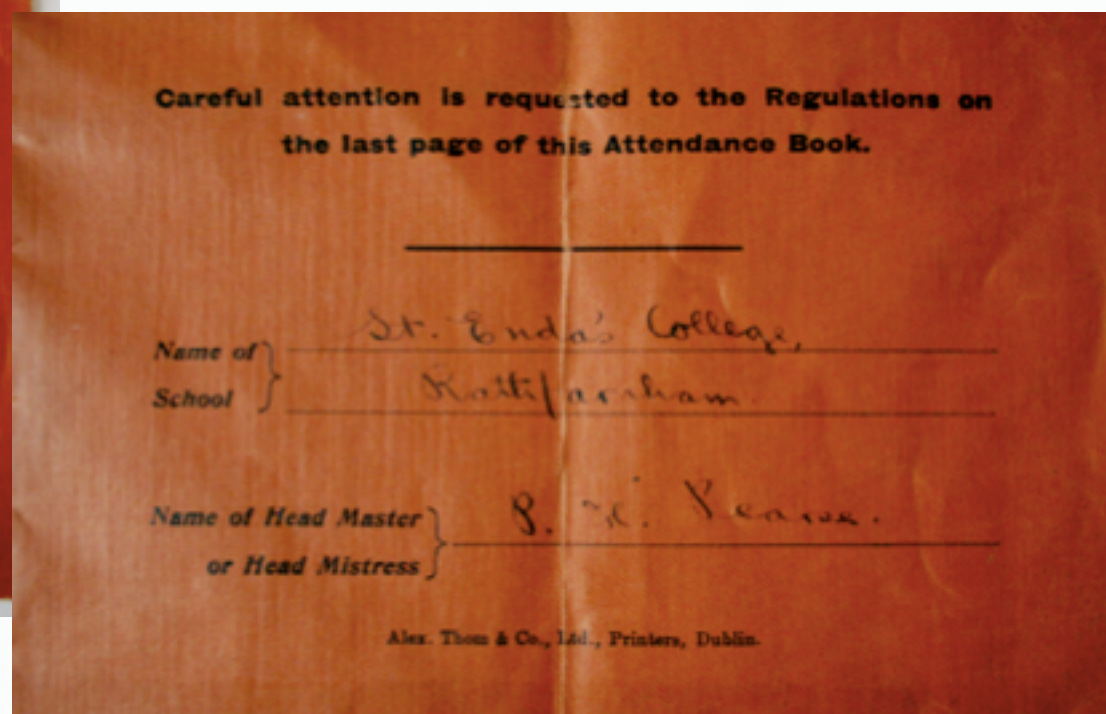

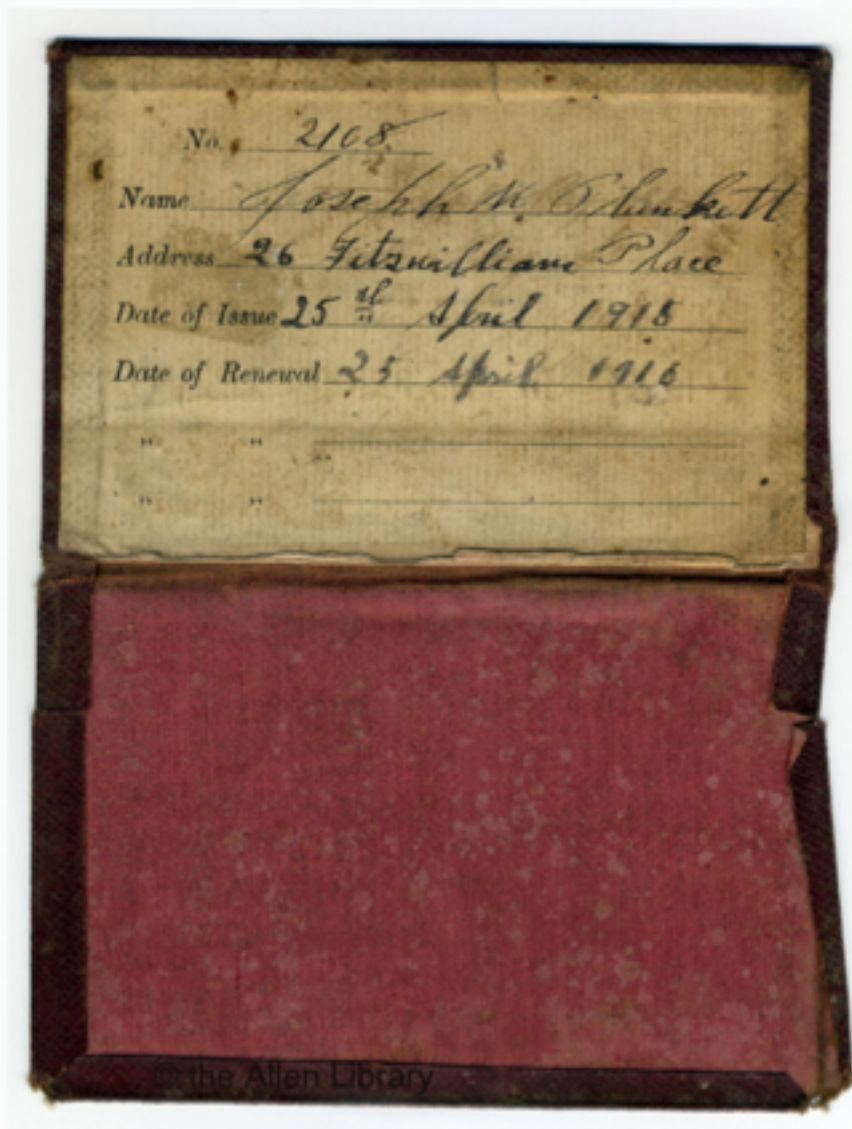

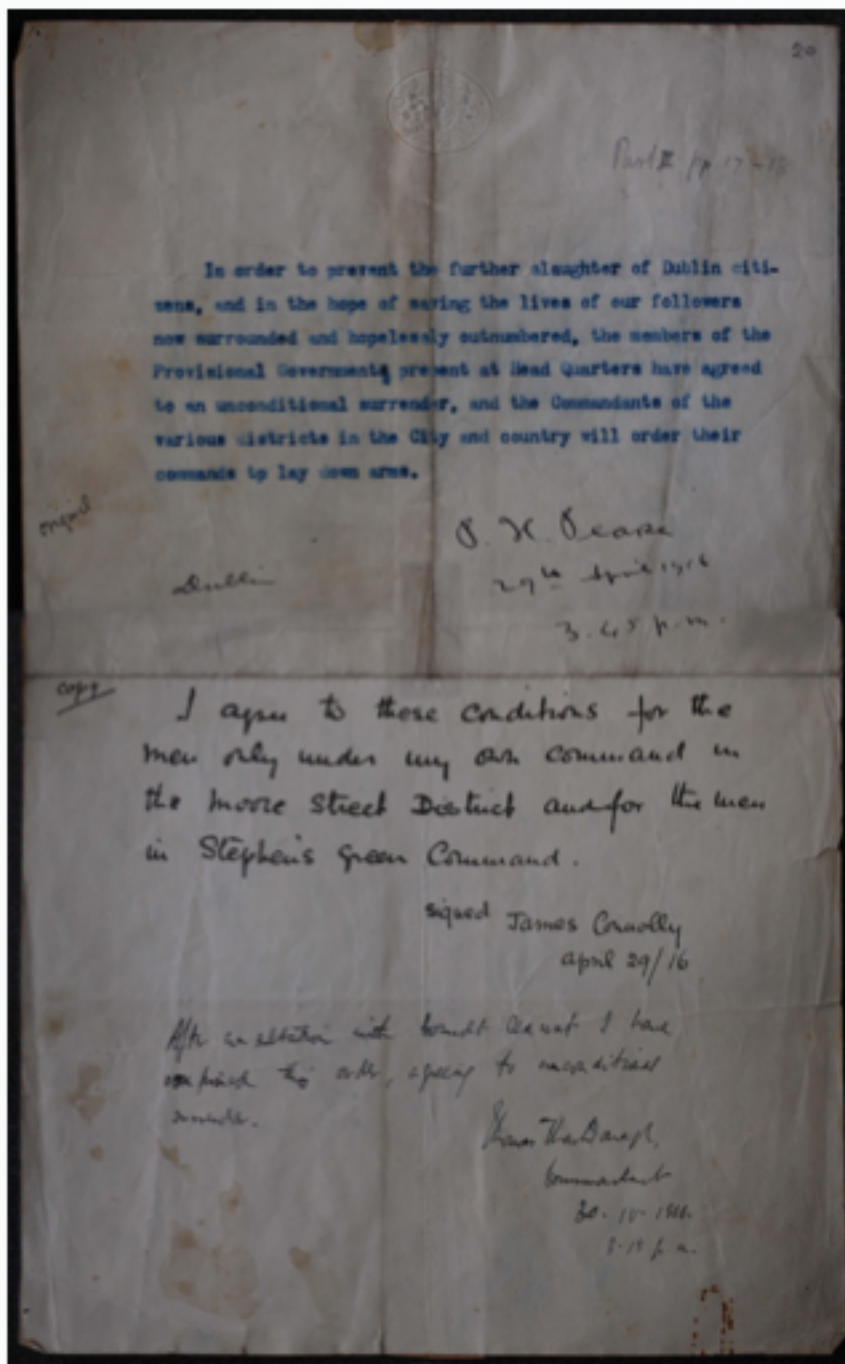

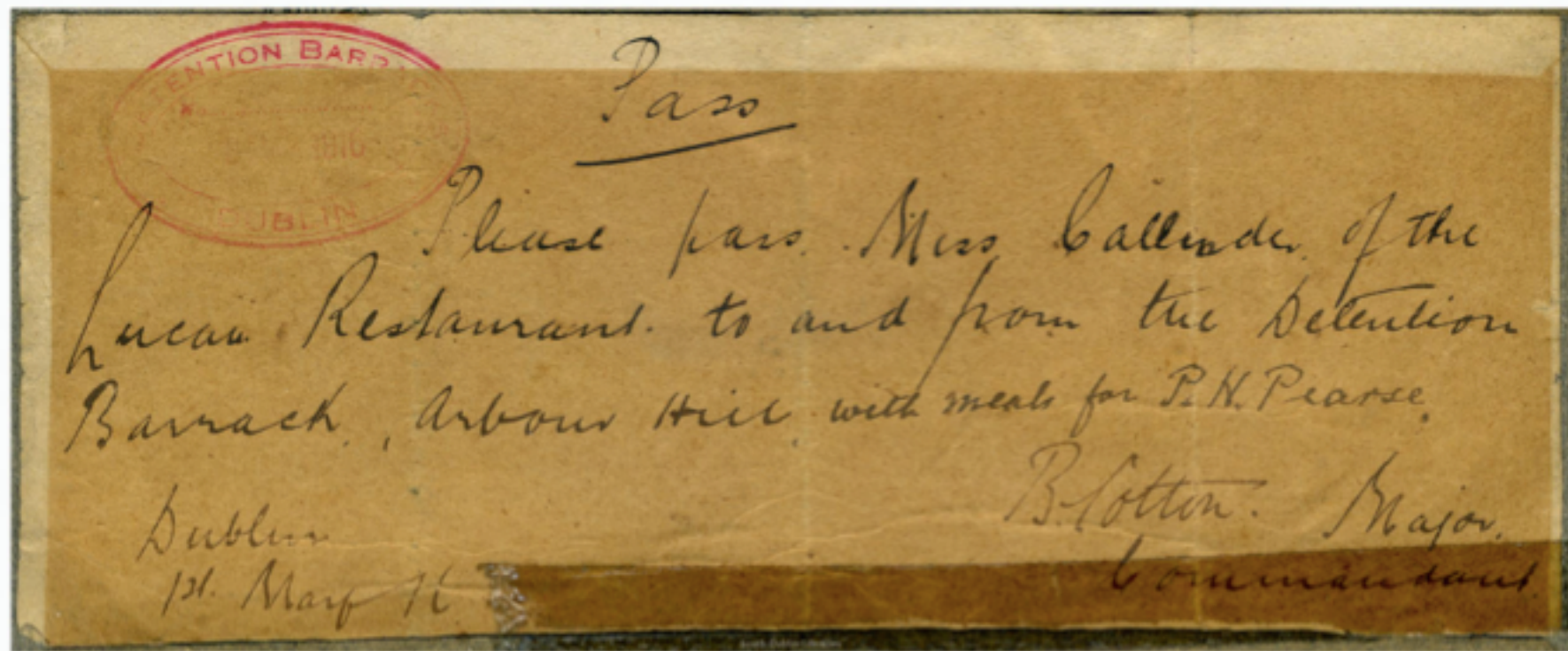
